While certainly not the majority, there are students who have caused complaints. In June Olympic Village hosted an informal lunch meeting with representatives of the school, the neighbourhood police service and the administration of the Village. A protocol was put together to address any future issues while at the same time rewarding students for good community spirit. These rewards will include a free mini-golf session, having the school choral perform at the Olympic Village Christmas party and, the Village providing student recognition gift certificates at the school's annual graduation.

n the Spring 2004 Neighbours we asked you how ■ Dufferin Street got it's name. Until the 1880s Dufferin Street was known as Side Line and it was the western boundary of the City. In 1876 the street was named after the Governor General of the day, Frederick Temple Blackwood (1826-1902) who was also known as Lord Dufferin. In 1878 Lord Dufferin opened the first Canadian National Exhibition. A draw of correct submissions was held and the lucky winner is Zachar Kruglyak, a resident of Pacific Way in Mississauga. In 1968, six communities went from being called Toronto Township to the Town of Mississauga. In 1974 two villages were added (Streetsville and Port Credit) to make up what today is the City of Mississauga. Today Mississauga is Canada's sixth largest municipality with a population of 680,000. Ranked as a top 100 employer and recognized as Canada's safest city, Mississauga is celebrating its 30th anniversary this year. This issue's questoin is about Mississauga.
