

Have You Ever Wondered ...?

With the coming of snow and cold temperatures, do you sometimes wonder about curious things, like what happens to spiders in winter, for example? Why are all snowflakes different and how does anyone know for sure that they are? Will the Leafs ever win another Stanley Cup?

A little research helps solve at least some of these mysteries.

Thanks to something like antifreeze in their blood, spiders are often able to hibernate through the cold winter months. They make a burrow or find a hole and, if they're lucky, they hide there, snug as a bug, until spring. Even if a spider dies from the cold, its eggs may well survive to hatch in the warming weather.

The short answer on snowflakes is that they likely are all different. The number of possible ways to make a snowflake makes that almost certain. Snowflakes start out as tiny ice particles within a cloud. As they grow, they develop branches on six sides that change as the flake moves about in the cloud. The randomness of movement and temperature changes creates snowflakes in an endless variety of patterns.

As for the Leafs, only time will tell!

Good Neighbours

Shopping Carts: If you must use a shopping cart to transport your groceries, please be careful not to damage the building's walls and doors with it, and return the cart to the grocery store immediately after unloading your groceries. To avoid having to make a return trip every time you buy groceries, you could purchase a portable shopping bag and use it each time you shop.

In-suite Washing Machines and Dishwashers: Remember, washing appliances are not allowed in suites, because MetCap buildings are not designed to accommodate them. Use of these machines can cause water backups that ultimately cause flooding. Be a good neighbour: use the common laundry facilities provided in your building.

Tips for Heating Your Suite this Winter: To help you feel cozy at home this winter, make sure the heat can circulate properly in your rooms. Keep some space between the radiators and your furniture, and keep drapes off the radiators, so the heat can do its work. Keep windows closed and consider applying weather stripping for extra insulation from the cold. Never use your stove to warm the air in your apartment; this could overload the breakers or cause a fire. If you have any heating issues, contact your Building Manager for help.

Dealing with Bedbugs: Bedbug infestation is a problem in Toronto, according to a recent story in The Toronto Star. Tiny and resilient, bedbugs hide during the day in all kinds of places, like electrical outlets and book spines, can travel between apartment suites, live up to 18 months without eating and, particularly in egg form, are difficult to get rid of even using a vacuum cleaner. Experts cited in the Star suggest a cheap and effective way to deal with bedbugs: put each foot of your beds into a set of two bowls, a small one inside a larger one that is lined with talcum powder. Talcum powder punctures the bugs' shells and dehydrates them. Because bedbugs can move easily from one suite to others, all residents should keep an eye out for the bugs, and implement this simple system if you suspect the bugs have moved in with you.
