Canada Day: A Brief History

Each year on July 1, Canadians celebrate Canada Day, the anniversary of the Constitution Act of 1867, which joined Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and the Province of Canada (now Ontario and Quebec) into a single country. Formerly known as "Dominion Day," Canada Day is now a national holiday marked with fireworks, parades and festivals.

The first celebration on this day was held in 1917 to honour Canada's 50th birthday, but the holiday was not officially recognized until 1982. Turning 144 years old this year, Canada has much that's good to offer; Canadians are indeed fortunate to call this land home.

Stay Safe and Secure Throughout Your Building. The Toronto Police Service offers the following tips to help ensure that building residents are safe and secure in their homes. More details are available at www.torontopolice.on.ca/crimeprevention/apartment.php.

Lobby Security

- Unknown or suspicious persons trying to get into the building should be referred to management or security
- Do not allow strangers to enter the building as you are leaving or entering. Keep the main outer doors locked at all times
- Do not buzz anyone into the building whom you don't know

Elevator Safety

- Look to see who's in the elevator before entering
- Do not enter the elevator if you do not feel comfortable; wait for the next one
- When in the elevator, stand beside the control panel
- If a suspicious person enters the elevator, exit before the doors close

Door Security

- Never open your door to a stranger
- Never leave your door unlocked, even while taking out the garbage

In addition, to stay safe in your parking garage, look around before you walk to or leave your car. If you see someone loitering there that you don't recognize, either return to the building or stay in your car;
